Description

Austin SuperLynxTM 12V SMT (surface mount technology) power modules are non-isolated DC-DC converters that can deliver up to 16A of output current with full load efficiency of 92% at 3.3V output. These modules provide a precisely regulated output voltage ranging from 0.75Vdc to 5.5Vdc, programmable via an external resistor over a wide range of input voltage ($V_{IN} = 10 - 14Vdc$).




Figure 1. Converter Efficiency versus Output Current (Vout = 0.75Vdc).




Figure 4. Converter Efficiency versus Output Current (Vout = 1.8Vdc).




Figure 2. Converter Efficiency versus Output Current (Vout = 1.2Vdc).




Figure 5. Converter Efficiency versus Output Current (Vout = 2.5Vdc).




Figure 3. Converter Efficiency versus Output Current (Vout = 1.5Vdc).




Figure 6. Converter Efficiency versus Output Current (Vout = 3.3Vdc).




Figure 7. Input voltage vs. Input Current (Vout = 5.0Vdc).




Figure 8. Typical Output Ripple and Noise (Vin = 12V dc, Vo = 2.5 Vdc, Io = 16A).




Figure 9. Typical Output Ripple and Noise (Vin = 12V dc, Vo = 5.0 Vdc, Io = 16A).




Figure 10. Transient Response to Dynamic Load Change from 50% to 100% of full load (Vo = 5.0Vdc).




Figure 11. Transient Response to Dynamic Load Change from 100% to 50% of full load (Vo = 5.0 Vdc).




Figure 12. Transient Response to Dynamic Load Change from 50% to 100% of full load (Vo = 5.0 Vdc, Cext = 2x150 μF Polymer Capacitors).




Figure 13. Transient Response to Dynamic Load Change from 100% of 50% full load (Vo = 5.0 Vdc, Cext = $2x150~\mu F$ Polymer Capacitors).




Figure 14. Typical Start-Up Using Remote On/Off (Vin = 12Vdc, Vo = 5.0Vdc, Vo = 16A).




Figure 15. Typical Start-Up Using Remote On/Off with Low-ESR external capacitors (7x150uF Polymer) (Vin = 12Vdc, Vo = 5.0Vdc, Io = 16A, Co = 1050μ F).




Figure 16. Typical Start-Up with application of Vin with low-ESR polymer capacitors at the output (7x150 μ F) (Vin = 12Vdc, Vo = 5.0Vdc, Io = 16A, Co = 1050 μ F).




Figure 17 Typical Start-Up with Prebias (Vin = 12Vdc, Vo = 5.0Vdc, Io = 1A, Vbias = 3.3 Vdc).




Figure 18. Output short circuit Current (Vin = 12Vdc, Vo = 0.75Vdc).




Figure 19. Derating Output Current versus Local Ambient Temperature and Airflow (Vin = 12Vdc, Vo=0.75Vdc).




Figure 22. Derating Output Current versus Local Ambient Temperature and Airflow (Vin = 12Vdc, Vo=5.0 Vdc).




Figure 20. Derating Output Current versus Local Ambient Temperature and Airflow (Vin = 12Vdc, Vo=1.8 Vdc).





Figure 21. Derating Output Current versus Local Ambient Temperature and Airflow (Vin = 12Vdc, Vo=3.3 Vdc).


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

Design Considerations Input Filtering

The Austin SuperLynxTM 12V SMT module should be connected to a low-impedance source. A highly inductive source can affect the stability of the module. An input capacitance must be placed directly adjacent to the input pin of the module, to minimize input ripple voltage and ensure module stability.




Figure 26. Input ripple voltage for various output with 6x47 μF tantalum capacitors and with 6x22 μF ceramic capacitors at the input (full load).

In a typical application, 6x47 μ F low-ESR tantalum capacitors (AVX part #: TPSE476M025R0100, 47 μ F 25V 100 m Ω ESR tantalum capacitor) will be sufficient to provide adequate ripple voltage at the input of the module. To further minimize ripple voltage at the input, very low ESR ceramic capacitors are recommended at the input of the module. Figure 26 shows input ripple voltage (mVp-p) for various outputs with 6x47 μ F tantalum capacitors and with 6x22 μ F ceramic capacitor (TDK part #: C4532X5R1C226M) at full load.

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Design Considerations (continued)

Output Filtering

The Austin SuperLynxTM 12V SMT module is designed for low output ripple voltage and will meet the maximum output ripple specification with 1 μF ceramic and 10 μF tantalum capacitors at the output of the module. However, additional output filtering may be required by the system designer for a number of reasons. First, there may be a need to further reduce the output ripple and noise of the module. Second, the dynamic response characteristics may need to be customized to a particular load step change.

To reduce the output ripple and improve the dynamic response to a step load change, additional capacitance at the output can be used. Low ESR polymer and ceramic capacitors are recommended to improve the dynamic response of the module. For stable operation of the module, limit the capacitance to less than the maximum output capacitance as specified in the electrical specification table.

Safety Considerations

For safety agency approval the power module must be installed in compliance with the spacing and separation requirements of the end-use safety agency standards, i.e., UL 60950-1, CSA C22.2 No. 60950-1-03, and VDE 0850:2001-12 (EN60950-1) Licensed.

For the converter output to be considered meeting the requirements of safety extra-low voltage (SELV), the input must meet SELV requirements. The power module has extra-low voltage (ELV) outputs when all inputs are ELV.

The input to these units is to be provided with a fast-acting fuse with a maximum rating of 15A in the positive input lead.

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Feature Description

Remote On/Off




Figure 27. Remote On/Off Implementation.

The Austin SuperLynxTM 12V SMT power modules feature an On/Off pin for remote On/Off operation of the module. If not using the remote On/Off pin, leave the pin open (module will be On). The On/Off pin signal (Von/Off) is referenced to ground. To switch the module on and off using remote On/Off, connect an open collector npn transistor between the On/Off pin and GND (See Figure 27).

During a logic-high (On/Off pin is pulled high internal to the module) when the transistor is in the Off state, the power module is ON. The maximum allowable leakage current of the transistor when Von/off = $V_{IN,max}$ is $10\mu A$. During a logic-low when the transistor is turned-on, the power module is OFF. During this state VOn/Off is less than 0.3V and the maximum IOn/Off = 1mA.

Overcurrent Protection

To provide protection in a fault (output overload) condition, the unit is equipped with internal current-limiting circuitry and can endure current limiting continuously. At the point of current-limit inception, the unit enters hiccup mode. The unit operates normally once the output current is brought back into its specified range. The typical average output current during hiccup is 3A.

Input Undervoltage Lockout

At input voltages below the input undervoltage lockout limit, module operation is disabled. The module will begin to operate at an input voltage above the undervoltage lockout turn-on threshold.

Overtemperature Protection

To provide protection in a fault condition, the unit is equipped with a thermal shutdown circuit. The unit will shutdown if the thermal reference point $T_{\rm ref}$, exceeds 125°C (typical), but the thermal shutdown is not intended as a guarantee that the unit will survive temperatures beyond its rating. The module will automatically restarts after it cools down.

Output Voltage Programming




Figure 28. Circuit configuration to program output voltage using an external resistor.

The output voltage of the Austin SuperLynxTM 12V can be programmed to any voltage from 0.75Vdc to 5.5Vdc by connecting a resistor (shown as Rtrim in Figure 28) between the Trim and GND pins of the module. Without an external resistor between the Trim and GND pins, the output of the module will be 0.7525Vdc. To calculate the value of the trim resistor, Rtrim for a desired output voltage, use the following equation:


$$Rtrim = \left[\frac{10500}{Vo - 0.7525} - 1000\right]\Omega$$

Rtrim is the external resistor in Ω

Vo is the desired output voltage

For example, to program the output voltage of the Austin SuperLynx $^{\rm TM}$ 12V module to 1.8V, *Rtrim* is calculated as follows:

$$Rtrim = \left[\frac{10500}{1.8 - 0.75} - 1000 \right]$$




Figure 29. Circuit Configuration for programming Output voltage using external voltage source.

Austin SuperLynx[™] 12Vdc can also be programmed by applying a voltage between the TRIM and GND pins (Figure 29). The following equation can be used to determine the value of *Vtrim* needed to obtain a desired output voltage Vo:

$$Vtrim = (0.7 - 0.0667 \times \{Vo - 0.7525\})$$

For example, to program the output voltage of a SuperLynxTM module to 3.3 Vdc, Vtrim is calculated as follows:

$$Vtrim = (0.7 - 0.0667 \times \{3.3 - 0.7525\})$$

Vtrim = 0.530V

By using a 1% tolerance trim resistor, set point tolerance of $\pm 2\%$ is achieved as specified in the electrical specification. The POL Programming Tool, available at www.gecriticalpower.com under the Design Tools section, helps determine the required external trim resistor needed for a specific output voltage.

The amount of power delivered by the module is defined as the voltage at the output terminals multiplied by the output current. When using the trim feature, the output voltage of the module can be increased, which at the same output current would increase the power output of the module. Care should be taken

to ensure that the maximum output power of the module remains at or below the maximum rated power ($P_{max} = V_{o,set} \times I_{o,max}$).

Voltage Margining




Figure 30. Circuit Configuration for margining Output voltage.

Output voltage margining can be implemented in the Austin SuperLynx $^{\text{TM}}$ 12V SMT modules by connecting a resistor, $R_{\text{margin-up}}$, from the Trim pin to the ground pin for margining-up the output voltage and by connecting a resistor, $R_{\text{margin-down}}$, from the Trim pin to the Output pin for margining-down. Figure 30 shows the circuit configuration for output voltage margining. The POL Programming Tool, available at www.gecriticalpower.com under the Design Tools section, also calculates the values of $R_{\text{margin-up}}$ and $R_{\text{margin-down}}$ for a specific output voltage and % margin. Please consult your local GE

Remote Sense




Figure 31. Remote sense circuit configuration.

The Austin SuperLynx[™] 12V 12V SMTpower modules have a Remote Sense feature to minimize the effects of distribution losses by regulating the voltage at the Remote Sense pin (See Figure 31). The voltage between the Sense pin and Vo pin must not exceed 0.5V.

The amount of power delivered by the module is defined as the output voltage multiplied by the output current (Vo x Io). When using Remote Sense, the output voltage of the module can increase, which if the same output is maintained, increases the power output by the module. Make sure that the maximum output power of the module remains at or below the maximum rated power. When the Remote Sense feature is not being used, connect the Remote Sense pin to output pin.


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Thermal Considerations

Power modules operate in a variety of thermal environments; however, sufficient cooling should always be provided to help ensure reliable operation.




Figure 32. Tref Temperature measurement location.




Figure 33. Thermal Test Set-up.

Considerations include ambient temperature, airflow, module power dissipation, and the need for increased reliability. A reduction in the operating temperature of the module will result in an increase in reliability. The thermal data presented here is based on physical measurements taken in a wind tunnel. The test set-up is shown in Figure 33. Note that the airflow is parallel to the short axis of the module as shown in figure 32. The derating data applies to airflow in either direction of the module's short axis.

The thermal reference point, T_{ref} used in the specifications is shown in Figure 32. For reliable operation this temperature should not exceed 115° C.

The output power of the module should not exceed the rated power of the module (Vo,set x Io,max).

Please refer to the Application Note "Thermal Characterization Process For Open-Frame Board-Mounted Power Modules" for a detailed discussion of thermal aspects including maximum device temperatures.

Heat Transfer via Convection

Increased airflow over the module enhances the heat transfer via convection. Thermal derating curves showing the maximum output current that can be delivered at different local ambient temperature (T_A) for airflow conditions ranging from natural convection and up to 2m/s (400 ft./min) are shown in the Characteristics Curves section.

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

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



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Surface Mount Information

Pick and Place

The Austin SuperLynx[™] 12V SMT modules use an open frame construction and are designed for a fully automated assembly process. The modules are fitted with a label designed to provide a large surface area for pick and place operations. The label meets all the requirements for surface mount processing, as well as safety standards, and is able to withstand reflow temperatures of up to 300°C. The label also carries product information such as product code, serial number and the location of manufacture.




Figure 34. Pick and Place Location.

Nozzle Recommendations

The module weight has been kept to a minimum by using open frame construction. Even so, these modules have a relatively large mass when compared to conventional SMT components. Variables such as nozzle size, tip style, vacuum pressure and placement speed should be considered to optimize this process. The minimum recommended nozzle diameter for reliable operation is 6mm. The maximum nozzle outer diameter, which will safely fit within the allowable component spacing, is 9 mm.

Oblong or oval nozzles up to 11×9 mm may also be used within the space available.

Reflow Soldering Information

The Austin SuperLynx[™] 12V SMT power modules are large mass, low thermal resistance devices and typically heat up slower than other SMT components. It is recommended that the customer review data sheets in order to customize the solder reflow profile for each application board assembly. The following instructions must be observed when soldering these units. Failure to observe these instructions may result in the failure of or cause damage to the modules, and can adversely affect long-term reliability.

Typically, the eutectic solder melts at 183°C, wets the land, and subsequently wicks the device connection. Sufficient

time must be allowed to fuse the plating on the connection to ensure a reliable solder joint. There are several types of SMT reflow technologies currently used in the industry. These surface mount power modules can be reliably soldered using natural forced convection, IR (radiant infrared), or a combination of convection/IR. For reliable soldering the solder reflow profile should be established by accurately measuring the modules pin temperatures.




Figure 35. Reflow Profile.

An example of a reflow profile (using 63/37 solder) for the Austin SuperLynxTM 12V SMT power module is :

- Pre-heating zone: room temperature to 183°C (2.0 to 4.0 minutes maximum)
- Initial ramp rate < 2.5°C per second
- Soaking Zone: 155 °C to 183 °C − 60 to 90 seconds typical (2.0 minutes maximum)
- Reflow zone ramp rate:1.3°C to 1.6°C per second
- Reflow zone: 210°C to 235°C peak temperature 30 to 60 seconds (90 seconds maximum

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Surface Mount Information (continued) Lead Free Soldering

The –Z version Austin SuperLynx 12V SMT modules are lead-free (Pb-free) and RoHS compliant and are both forward and backward compatible in a Pb-free and a SnPb soldering process. Failure to observe the instructions below may result in the failure of or cause damage to the modules and can adversely affect long-term reliability.

Pb-free Reflow Profile




Figure 36. Recommended linear reflow profile using Sn/Ag/Cu solder.

Power Systems will comply with J-STD-020 Rev. C (Moisture/Reflow Sensitivity Classification for Nonhermetic Solid State Surface Mount Devices) for both Pb-free solder profiles and MSL classification procedures. This standard provides a recommended forced-air-convection reflow profile based on the volume and thickness of the package (table 4-2). The suggested Pb-free solder paste is Sn/Ag/Cu (SAC). The recommended linear reflow profile using Sn/Ag/Cu solder is shown in Figure. 36.

MSL Rating

The Austin SuperLynx 12V SMT modules have a MSL rating of 2a.

Storage and Handling

The recommended storage environment and handling procedures for moisture-sensitive surface mount packages is detailed in J-STD-033 Rev. A (Handling, Packing, Shipping and Use of Moisture/Reflow Sensitive Surface Mount Devices). Moisture barrier bags (MBB) with desiccant are required for MSL ratings of 2 or greater. These sealed

packages should not be broken until time of use. Once the original package is broken, the floor life of the product at conditions of <= 30°C and 60% relative humidity varies according to the MSL rating (see J-STD-033A). The shelf life for dry packed SMT packages will be a minimum of 12 months from the bag seal date, when stored at the following conditions: < 40° C, < 90% relative humidity.

Post Solder Cleaning and Drying Considerations

Post solder cleaning is usually the final circuit-board assembly process prior to electrical board testing. The result of inadequate cleaning and drying can affect both the reliability of a power module and the testability of the finished circuit-board assembly. For guidance on appropriate soldering, cleaning and drying procedures, refer to Board Mounted Power Modules: Soldering and Cleaning Application Note (AN04-001).


